Transition at the Padua is taking place. After three years of dedicated service Mrs. Alicia Smith, the educational coordinator at the Center, has left to continue her studies. Alicia came to the Center in 2008 after leading a charter school in Detroit, Michigan for two years. She used her organizational skills and her love of children to enrich the Padua Center experience. Through her leadership, Padua Center saw growth and stability. Most evident is the positive influence she had in the lives of the young men and women she nurtured. Mrs. Alicia Smith affected nearly 250 children during her tenure at Padua Center.

Along with her son Joseph, they started Maturing Young Men, a program that mentors young men and grooms them to become productive citizens. Her vision created numerous collaborations with the Boy Scouts Of America, the University Of Toledo, the City of Toledo, the Elks Lodge, Council Woman Paula Hicks-Hudson and Dr. Morris Jenkins of the University of Toledo. Padua Center will truly miss Alicia; she will continue her work in the community as she pursues her Master’s degree in criminology at the University of Toledo. The Center will honor Alicia at the “Peaces of Art” banquet and silent auction on Oct. 16, 2011.

Mrs. Tami Rehkla, head teacher in the after school program, completed her Ameri-Corps service and moves onto further her education. Mrs. Tami Rehkla, came to Padua Center in 2009 as a student from Owens College. Tami’s skill and inspiration brought the tutoring program to a highly successful level. The Center saw her love for children daily. According to Tami, coming from the suburbs it was a cultural awakening to work with minority children. Working with staff from Toledo Grows, the children had a fun time building two vertical hydroponic garden systems. Mercy Health System procured a grant entitled, "Access to Food," which provided for the systems.

The children planted peppers, greens, and tomatoes in the styrofoam pots. The garden system is a pole and pod system with a 55-gallon barrel to water the garden through a pump system.

Agneta Seeley taught the girls to sew and each one produced a pillow cover. In October the girls will learn to sew pajama bottoms! On September 23, the Toledo Women's Bar Association conducted a session on telephone etiquette and professional development. Humor ring tones and disrupting calls help dramatize how to use cell phones. The Q and A with women lawyers was very enlightening for the girls. The Emerging Young Ladies will continue to meet through the year. Mrs. Kim Algee and Mrs. Tracy Harmon are among the mentors who are meeting with the girls.



The Maturing Young Men is a program to give an alternative to gangs, and the negative influences in life.

The young men are enrolling in flight school and after 1,000 hours they will have their flight certificates. Mrs. Alicia Smith and her son, Joseph, will continue the Maturing Young Men program separate from Padua Center.
